Rockford Wins Local Society Incentive Grant

The AIA is excited to announce the Rockford, Illinois Society as the winner of the 2005 Local Society Incentive Grant. The winning proposal was for an all-day community film forum. The event, which will be held on Saturday, March 12th from 1–8 p.m. is entitled "Reel Archaeology: A Forum on Archaeology in Film" and will feature five noted scholars commenting on a range of popular contemporary films including *The Passion of the Christ, Gladiator, Troy, Alexander, Ben Hur, The Mummy* and others.

With the recent influx of historical cinematic projects, this is a unique opportunity to hear from experts, who will apply an in-depth, historical, and archaeological perspective to these films. The Rockford Society anticipates a large turnout, and promises a captivating and enlightening event for all attendees.

The Local Society Incentive Grant is a wonderful opportunity for local societies to put their best creative ideas for community outreach into effect.

The Grant provides \$1,000 to a local society for a project or program to be implemented between January and December 2006. Incentive Grant Winner Update



The Tucson Society's "Reconstruction of an Ancient Greek Ceramic Kiln" has met with tremendous success. The Tucson Society was the winner of the first Local Society Incentive Grant in 2004, which they used to construct an authentic Ancient Greek-style kiln. The project was undertaken in order to educate and involve AIA members and local schools, as well as the community, in the techniques, manufacture, and firing of Greek-style pottery. After the kiln is completed, it will be used as a fundraiser for subsequent firings. K–12 schools will have the facility made available to them so that students can learn firsthand about this important aspect of ancient cultures.

After a dedicated educational outreach with site visits, lectures, and workshops to local high schools during spring 2004, the construction of the kiln started in fall 2004 at a local high school. The kiln is currently nearing the final stages of completion. The most difficult structural parts such as the combustion chamber, stoking channel, central column, and perforated floor are in place, leaving only the upper chamber of the kiln and the firing schedule to be finalized. Eleni Hasaki, Vice President of the Tucson Society, reports that "The learning experience was wonderful, and many people contributed materials, time, and knowledge towards this project."
